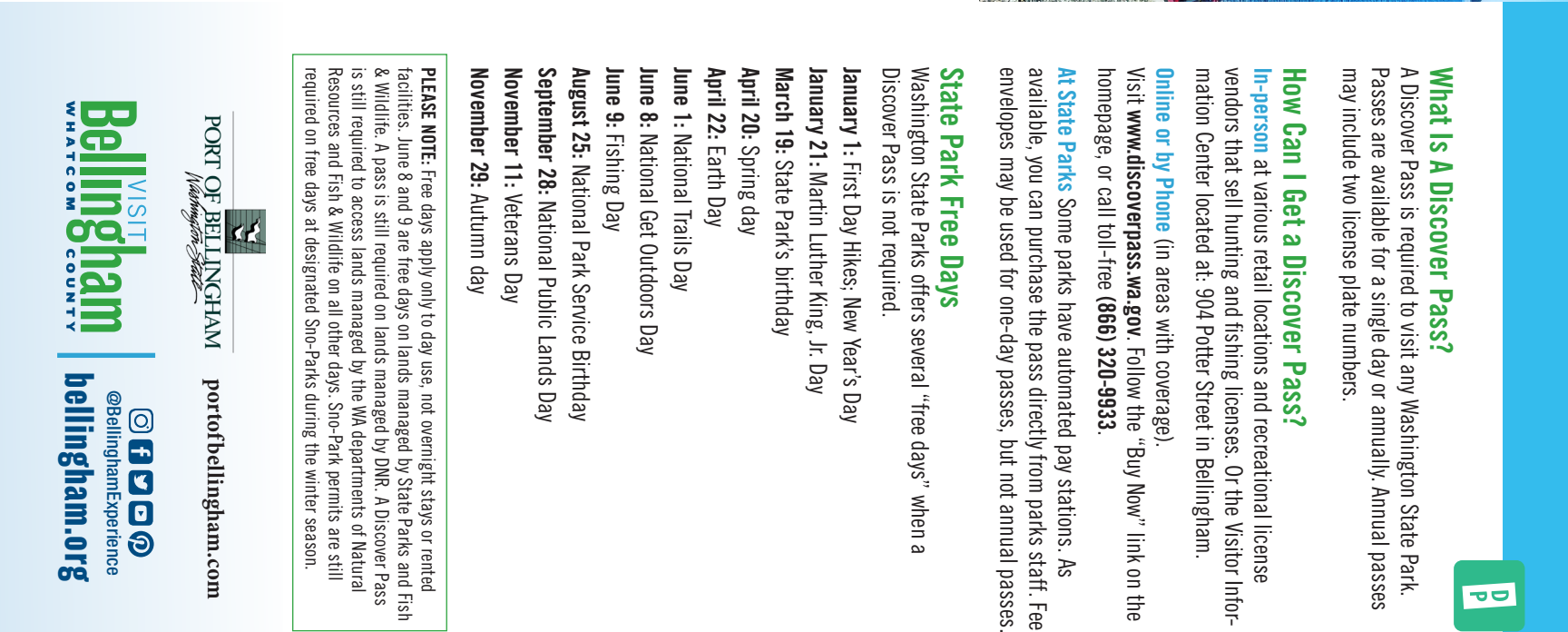

The Whatcom Water trail is unique and diverse, offering over 100 miles of shoreline. Our goal in creating this map is to provide access to many of Whatcom's beautiful water access points, encourage education about natural resources, and foster community support and conservation of our great outdoors.

Semiahmoo: Contains a mile-long trail that connects the ends of the peninsula. The county park features Semiahmoo Museum, which details the area's history as a bustling headquarters for the salmon canning. With 300 acres of tidelands, Semiahmoo is perfect for a peaceful stroll, birdwatching, beachcombing, a family picnic, or simply enjoying spectacular views of Mt. Baker, Twin Sisters, Drayton Harbor, and Boundary Bay.

Lighthouse Marine Park: This park is located at the southwest tip of Point Roberts, with gorgeous panoramic views of the water. A great place to watch for orcas.

Lake Whatcom: A great freshwater kayaking destination. Lake Whatcom is surrounded by hills, waterfalls and giant old Douglas fir trees. Kayak, pedal boats and stand up paddle board (SUP) rentals are available at Bloedel Donovan Park.

Wildcat Cove: Located at Larrabee State Park, Wildcat Cove is six miles south of Bellingham off of scenic Chuckanut Drive. It is a great place for a day trip or an overnight excursion. Along the shoreline you can marvel at the unique shapes of Chuckanut sandstone that have been sculpted by the wind and water.
